

**Shoreline Community College  
Community Neighborhood Meeting Summary  
June 13, 2018**

Since 2015, neighbors have gathered regularly to meet with Shoreline Community College President and members of the Executive Team about the campus activities and future plans. The President and Executive Team enjoy listening to and answering questions the neighbors have regarding the College. These meetings have influenced College decisions and have built strong relationships between the College and neighbors.

Facilitator, Laura Rehrmann, started the meeting by asking the neighbors what questions they would like answered during the evening's discussion. Several neighbors had questions about the Residence Hall now under construction and the multi-way intersection. Each of the questions were on the agenda for discussion.

**College Strategic Plan Goal: the 3 E's – President Cheryl Roberts, Ed. D.**

President Cheryl Roberts reported on one of the College's Strategic Plan goals called the 3 E's – Ecological Integrity, Economic Viability and Social Equity. This goal is being implemented throughout the college by:

- Hiring Dr. Gloria Ngezaho to direct employee engagement work in hiring, orienting and developing college employees
- Hiring a Sustainability Coordinator to help provide direction in campus-wide sustainability efforts
- Implementing a Sustainability Tracking Assessment Rating System (STARS) to focus on reaching a carbon neutral college goal by 2050

For the second year, the College has received the Tree Campus USA designation by the Arbor Day Foundation. One of 350 colleges nationwide to be so recognized, the campus arborist will direct removal of aged trees, replace them, and create signage for trees to create a living-learning campus environment. Neighbors are invited to join the Advisory Committee to assist in this effort.

**Capital Projects – Stuart Trippel, Senior Executive Director & CFO**

Student housing on campus is underway. The location is immediately inside the College's main entrance adjacent to the PUB, or student union building. The residence hall is for all students, both domestic and international. Below are some of the features of this project:

- Frontage improvements are required from the College's main entrance on Innis Arden Way to 160th and Dayton
- Neighbors will receive advance notices of increased construction traffic as large equipment moves in and the crane is erected in mid-July
- The residence hall will be six stories with 68 units and will house 216-230 students.
- Most units are designed for four students, all have kitchens, bathrooms, and a living space
- The building is a concrete base with wood frame on the upper five levels
- There will be a Great Room, opening to a landscaped courtyard
- There will be 24-hour security with keycard main entrance for residents.
- Quiet hours will be in place
- The College will have a Director of Student and Residence Life with one Resident Advisor per floor to create and manage student life activities.

- The neighbors suggested communication with neighbors about the project be through email, NextDoor, Shoreline Area News, Shoreline Currents, and the City's Neighborhoods Coordinator, who will send information to the Neighborhood Council.
- The Allied Health, Science, and Advanced Manufacturing Complex design phase is underway, Construction is planned for July of 2019, pending state capital support and capital campaign funding. This is a replacement project for current buildings constructed in the late 60s. No new space will be added for students, but labs and building design will support our highly regarded allied health and science and advanced manufacturing programs.
- Two buildings will replace five current buildings on the north end of campus. These buildings are 2400 thru 2800 and total approximately 70,000 square feet.
- The Allied Health & Science building will house dental hygiene and a dental clinic, medical lab technology, biology, and chemistry.
- The second building will house Advanced Manufacturing, Bio-manufacturing, Clean Energy Technology and Computer and Electrical Engineering.
- There will be a phased construction design with the Allied Health & Science building completed before starting work on the Advanced Manufacturing Complex.

The STEAM building (science, technology, engineering, arts, and math) will replace building 2200, 2300 (nursing) and 800 (music). The funding is not yet in place from the legislature, but possible for the 2023-2025 biennium.

### Transportation and Intersection

The six-way intersection at Greenwood is on property owned by the City of Shoreline and the school district. Partners collaborating in the efforts to improve the intersection are the City of Shoreline, the Shoreline School District, Shoreline Community College and Metro.

- The College has hired a transportation consultant to review traffic patterns, suggest amendments to the College's Master Plan, and mitigate traffic concerns.
- Metro will continue to provide bus service and be part of resolving the intersection issues
- The planned light rail expansion north is expected to have transport connected to the College.

### Enrollment, Retention and Completion – Guy Hamilton, Acting VP for Student Learning and Success

Enrollment has grown by over 100 full-time equivalent domestic students a year for three years. This year the college's enrollment represents a 3% growth rate compared to the rest of the state community and technical colleges, which have experienced a decline of 2%.

- Our increase is attributed to targeted recruiting and advertising, information sessions, regular orientations, strong advising, and academic reputation.
- International student enrollment is down because of increased recruiting competition from universities and visa access challenges. With that said, like domestic enrollment, our international enrollment is out-performing the state average.
- The college is 21st in the country in the size of its international student enrollment (approximately 1,000). The college's headcount is over 10,000 students which is 13<sup>th</sup> out of 39 community colleges in the state.
- The college is among the top five community and technical colleges in completion.

## Community Engagement – Mary Brueggeman, VP for Advancement and Executive Director of the Foundation

- A capital campaign, the first for Shoreline Community College, will begin this fall to raise funds for the \$3 million match required by the state for the Allied Health, Sciences, and Advanced Manufacturing Complex.
- Seattle International Film Festival attracted 3797 attendees, the most to date and raised over \$13,000 for digital film and performing arts scholarships.
- The Shoreline Community College Foundation awarded \$142,000 in annual scholarships this spring and will award an additional \$100,000 in quarterly scholarships in the upcoming academic year. \$30,000 in emergency funds were awarded to support students in crisis in the 17-18 academic year.
- The annual Student Success Breakfast in November is a major community event raising support for students and Mary invited our neighbors to attend.

### Upcoming events and ways to get involved

- Volunteers are needed to support the Deep Roots Garden which raises vegetables for the student food pantry on campus. Pea patches are available to neighbors. To volunteer in the garden or sign up for a pea patch, email Adria McGrath at [amcgrath@shoreline.edu](mailto:amcgrath@shoreline.edu) soon.
